Fathers, do not exasperate your children, so that they will not lose heart (Colossians 3:21).

Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord (Ephesians 6:4).

How to exasperate your children and provoke them to anger

- 1. Mock them. (Tease them inordinately.)
- 2. Scold them frequently.
- 3. Constantly find fault with them.
- 4. Never praise or encourage them.
- 5. Make promises and then break them.
- 6. Make your love conditional.
- 7. Neglect or ignore your children.
- 8. Be violent with your children.
- 9. Fail to recognize growth and development.
- 10. Refuse to listen to them.
- 11. Let them do anything they want. (Be too permissive.)
- 12. Don't let them do anything. (Overprotect and restrict your children.)
- 13. Don't treat your children as persons.
- 14. Chastise them publicly.
- 15. Discipline them for no reason.
- 16. Discipline them inconsistently.
- 17. Discipline them fully for any and all offenses.
- 18. Hold to an inconsistent, arbitrary, or otherwise capricious standard.
- Make your own rules equal to God's commands (i.e., legalism).
- 20. Make unreasonable demands or expectations.
- 21. Show favoritism and frequently compare your children to others.
- 22. Foster discord and conflict in your marriage.
- 23. Reverse your roles in marriage.
- 24. Make the children the center of your home.
- 25. Exercise vindictive discipline (as opposed to corrective).
- 26. Exercise no self-control.
- 27. Do things that you would never allow your children to do. (Be a poor example for them.)
- 28. Do not admit when you are wrong and never ask for forgiveness.
- 29. Make your Christianity superficial.
- 30. Follow worldly standards in parenting.

How *not* to exasperate your children and provoke them to anger

- 1. Use words to build them up.
- 2. Approve them frequently.
- 3. Gently help your child identify and correct faults.
- 4. Consistently praise and encourage them.
- 5. Make judicious promises and keep them.
- 6. Make your love unconditional.
- 7. Care for and pay attention your children.
- 8. Be gentle with your children.
- 9. Recognize growth and development.
- 10. Be sure to listen to them.
- 11. Allow your children freedom in areas where they have proven themselves as faithful.
- 12. (See #11.)
- 13. Treat your children as persons.
- 14. Chastise them privately.
- 15. Discipline them only for reason.
- 16. Discipline them consistently.
- 17. Discipline them appropriate to the offense.
- 18. Hold to a consistent, logical, or otherwise predictable standard.
- 19. Derive your rules from God's commands, but maintain flexibility in enforcing them.
- 20. Make reasonable demands or expectations.
- 21. Show impartiality and do not compare your children to others.
- 22. Foster harmony and peace in your marriage.
- 23. Practice your biblical role in marriage.
- 24. Make Christ the center of your home.
- 25. Exercise corrective discipline (as opposed to vindictive).
- 26. Exercise self-control.
- 27. Do things that you would allow and encourage your children to do. (Be a good example for them.)
- 28. Do admit when you are wrong and ask for forgiveness.
- 29. Make your Christianity sincere.
- 30. Follow God's standards in parenting.
